

# 3rd EMCC-Intensive Course Perugia 16<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> June 2015

Every two years, all students of the EMCC ("European Master Classical Cultures") as well as the responsible professors and coordinators meet at one of the eleven partner universities. By integrating this interdisciplinary Intensive Course into the curriculum of the EMCC it's not just that students from different countries across Europe get the opportunity to meet each other and exchange personal experiences, but also get in close contact with the professors and staff. During the



course, each student gives a paper followed by a discussion dealing with his/her individual subject matter as well as methodological issues and problems of the ongoing Master thesis. Amongst the course the student's papers are part of a varied program that includes field trips to ancient monuments and museums. In doing so, the

communication between all students and coordinators is ensured throughout the program distinguishing the EMCC and its Intensive Course in a special way.



















Between the 16<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> of June 2015 the Intensive Course took place in the Italian city of Perugia perfectly organized by the responsible coordinator Prof. Massimo Nafissi who also took care of the student's accommodation and the week's schedule.

## <u>Tuesday, 16<sup>th</sup> June: Greetings / Papers / guided tour Perugia</u>

After most participants of the Course did already arrive in Perugia on Monday, the coordinators staff met а dinner that very and for The official opening took place in the next morning in one of the old lecture halls of the University of Perugia hosted by Prof. Massimo Nafissi (Perugia) and Prof. Ralf von den Hoff (Freiburg), the current spokesmen of the EMCC. All participants of this year's Intensive Course were warmly welcomed followed by the presentation of this year's schedule. Subsequently, two students gave their papers on their Master-thesis.

After a lunch break the group met again at the campus of the University; another two students gave their papers. Right from the start, it became apparent that both papers and the subsequent discussions in particular yield significant impacts on the student's theses.

This first and certainly very interesting day of the Course ended with an elaborate guided tour through Perugia that informed both about important events and facts

of local history to acquaint all participants with the city and its ancient remains.



### Wednesday, 17th June: Archaeological Museum / Papers

Before noon, yet another guided tour through the Archaeological Museum of Perugia was realized. Within this tour the guide gave an extensive survey of the large body of archaeological finds from Umbria referring <u>especially</u> to Umbrian cinerariums of late Hellenism.

Then, everyone got the opportunity to take a look around to explore further parts of the museum. After lunch, three students presented their master theses.

On the last day of the Intensive Course all participants visited the nearby Hypogeum of Volumni (a patrician family), which is part of a larger necropolis

highlighted by its elaborate design. The tomb is usually dated to the 2nd century B.C. giving an imposing impression Etruscan arave of art. Following the visit to the museum, the group headed back to the campus of the University to attend two more papers before having lunch. In the afternoon, a one-hour tour was given at the "Collegio del Cambio", the "money



exchange" of the Palazzo of Priori with its well-appointed audience hall with numerous elaborate wall paintings of the 15<sup>th</sup> century referring to to antiquity. The two last papers were given before Massimo Nafissi gave a lecture on "Politics and mythical topography. Aphareus' grave in Sparta and the relationship between ephoroi and basileis" in the evening. One last dinner with the whole group completed this year's Intensive Course.
