

# 5th EMCC – Intensive Course

# Rome – 18th – 20th June 2019

End of June 2019: as always, every second year, all current students in the European Master's Program EMCC ("European Master of Classical Cultures"), as well as the responsible coordinators and other employees of the program come together for a three-day Intensive Course including field trips and museum visits at the location of one of the twelve participating universities.

Due to the collaboration with the German Archaeological Institute (DAI) in Rome, initiated and realized 2016 by Ortwin Dally, director of the DAI Rome, the University Roma Tre as a member of the program, represented by Roberta Fabiani, and the excellent cooperation of these two institutions, this year's Intensive Course was held in Rome.

By integrating this interdisciplinary Intensive Course into the curriculum of the European Master, students from different European countries are given the opportunity to get to know each other, exchange ideas, and establish contacts with the responsible coordinators during the Course and beyond. During this Course, all students give a

paper (ca. 30 minutes) followed by a discussion dealing with his/her individual subject as well as methodological issues and problems of their ongoing master's theses.

These papers are part of a wide-ranging program which also includes field trips to ancient monuments, archaeological sites, and museums in the vicinity. In doing so, communication between the students and the academic staff of the program can be ensured, which once again characterizes the EMCC in a special way.

Between the 18th and 20th of June 2019, the international Intensive Course took place in Rome, Italy. The accommodation for students and coordinators and the field trips were perfectly prepared and organized by Ortwin Dally of the German Archaeological Institute (DAI) and Roberta Fabiani from the University Roma Tre.



# Thursday, 18th June 2019: Greetings/Papers/Field Trip

The official opening of the Intensive Course took place in the premises of the University Roma Tre, hosted by Roberta Fabiani (Rome) and Ralf von den Hoff (Freiburg), the current spokesman of the EMCC. Before welcoming all participants to this year's Course, two members of the University (Prof. Manfredi Merluzzi, Director of Humanities, and Prof. Luca Marcozzi) highlighted the importance of the EMCC program. Afterwards Prof. Ralf von den Hoff and Dr. Roberta Fabiani welcomed all participants and introduced this year's schedule of the Intensive Course.

Following the welcome, two students gave papers on their master's theses, followed by discussions.

#### Papers:


After these two stimulating papers, the participants gathered again in a lecture hall in the premises of the University for a presentation about the "Laurea Magistrale" by Mario de Nonno, a Classics study program, followed by a brief introduction of the EMCC program by Ralf von den Hoff and Roberta Fabiani focussing on its possibilities, basic structure and curriculum.

The presentations were followed by a report by one of the current students in the EMCC program, Cécile Schoumacher, who has recently completed her master's degree; she commenced her studies in Toulouse and spent one semester in Rome at the University Roma Tre. In her talk, Cécile stressed the significance of first-hand experience in excavations referring to her own participation in excavation projects on the Capitol Hill in Rome. In this regard she stressed the helpful mentoring system of the EMCC program, not only concerning the studies itself but also possibilities to participate in extracurricular activities such as practical courses like excavations. It became apparent during her report that the EMCC program—which includes Ancient History, Classical Philology and Classical Archaeology—provides a variety of possibilities for students but also established contacts beyond the program.

After a short lunch break all participants of the Intensive Course visited an ancient catacomb, the so called Catacomba di Santa Tecla situated near the Via Ostiense. The group enjoyed a guided tour through the catacomb by Dr. Giovana Ferri. This Christian catacomb was built on an older roman one that existed from the 1st century AD. There are multiple chambers inside, differing in shape and size while some are equipped with elaborate wall paintings and floor mosaics. Inside the catacomb there are also chamber tombs with multiple wall graves.







After this exciting visit of the Catacomba di Santa Tecla the participants of the Intensive Course met again at the University Roma Tre for another presentation by one of the students:

Paper:

 "Practical and organizational aspects concerning greek religious festivals"

Here, it already showed that the student's papers and the following discussions were key to the further development of their theses. Once again, the interdisciplinary qualities of the EMCC and the Intensive Course, along with its multilingualism, have proven to stimulate and encourage new perspectives. In the afternoon, a very stimulating paper was given by Prof. Francesco Prontera in honor of Prof. Peter Funke's retirement, being one of the founders of the EMCC program. Prof. Prontera gave a talk on "Mappae mundi da Erdoto (IV 36–45) a Polibio (III 36–38), followed by a joint dinner.

# Wednesday, 19th June 2019: Field Trip Capitol and Crypta Balbi/Papers

The second day of the Intensive Course began with field trips to several important and well-known archaeological sites and museums in Rome. First, we all met at the Capitoline Museums. Prof. Ortwin Dally gave an exciting tour through parts of the museum with a focus on the (structural) history of the Capitolium and its famous temple. It was rebuilt several times throughout the centuries. A part of its foundation can today be seen and observed in the museum. Its structure, consisting of large stone sections above tuff stone can also be examined here.



Following this tour we visited the "Museo Nazionale Romano Crypta Balbi" where we also enjoyed a guided tour. Crypta Balbi was once part of an ancient roman theatre constructed by Lucius Balbus Minor in the 1st century BC (dedicated 13 BC). The theatre is situated between two other famous theatres, that of Marcellus and Pompey. Inside the Museum, one can experience the history of the city of Rome through objects and illustrations.

After a lunch break all participants met again at the Villino Amelung (since 1990 guest house for fellows, colleagues and scholars of the DAI Rome) to listened to three further papers by the EMCC students.

All participants enjoyed the evening at the Villino before meeting again the next morning to continue with the student's papers.

After lunch, we listened to the last of the ten papers that have been presented during this year's course.

After this last presentation the EMCC coordinators and staff met to discuss the papers while the students were asked to evaluate the Intensive Course and the EMCC program. We met again for dinner where we discussed the past days and the experiences we shared throughout the week. This also included the opportunity for students to get in contact with the EMCC coordinators and staff.

# Friday, 21th June 2019: Final Discussion/Farewell

In the next morning, we met in the Villino Amelung for a review of the course. This year's course in Rome has been very inspiring and fruitful for both students and staff. The Intensive Course, taking place every two years, is essential to the EMCCs agenda of bringing together international students and researchers to foster scholarly and cultural exchange.
